

We celebrated Marconi's birthday with the special event callsign VI1MARCONI. Highlights included QRP DX getting as far as France and a club station in the Czech Republic. It was a bit of a fistful of a callsign to send, but certainly got some attention!



Cover story - HMAS Vampire back on the air after 35 years



HMAS Vampire was built at Cockatoo Island in Sydney Harbour, and served in the Royal Australian Navy from 1959 to 1986. Since 1997, her home has been the National Maritime Museum in Sydney.

Members of Manly-Warringah Radio Society have put Vampire back on the air with a refurbed Yaesu rig in the ship's radio room. VK2VMP looks like being a permanent part of Vampire's communications facility, where it will help promote the great hobby of Amateur Radio, and I'm sure, CW!

The team has been active on 20m and 40m already, and VK2VMP is on the air most Saturdays. The station is active other days depending on the availability of the team each day. Advertised frequencies are 7050kHz CW and 7150kHz SSB. So far we've had a QSO on 14036kHz CW and seen them on 14200kHz SSB.

If you're keen for a QSO, call them blind on their last seen frequency or add VK2VMP to your watchlist in HamAlert or your favourite spotting software, as their CQs so far seem to have lots of quiet space in between transmissions.



CW, circumnavigation, and CW buddies



John, VK4JE, actively assists, entices, helps and cajoles other radio enthusiasts and ham radio operators towards CW, with the final goal of keeping the art of Morse Code alive for future generations that are not here yet!

John was first licenced in February 1986 with the callsign VK2NEQ. Later that year he passed the Intermediate Exam and moved on to VK2KBG and a Yaesu FT-980.

In 1994 - 2000 he circumnavigated the world aboard A.Y. Sea-D and operated as VNNV International Marine Mobile.

John Moved to Queensland in 2000, and in 2019 became VK4JE and completely rebuilt his Station with a Yaesu FP-1030 Power Supply, a Yaesu FT-DX10, a West Mountain Radio RIGblaster DXPro, a remote MFJ-994BRT ATU and a GAP 20 Mono antenna.

Centenary of Trans-Tasman communications

The first amateur radio contact between New Zealand and Australia occurred on 26 April 1923. Frank Bell in Otago and Charles Maclurcan in Sydney make contact on 160 metres. On the centenary of this event, two messages were exchanged across 'the ditch' to mark the occasion.

During the weekly VKCW Net on 20 metres, Neil, ZL1NZ, sent the following:
